Since announcing plans to retire, I've felt like I've been in two worlds—one where I'm looking back on my career in the arts and one where I'm looking forward to new adventures and opportunities to learn and grow.

My path to a life in the arts started at the ripe old age of 3 when I first appeared on the Missouri Theater stage singing and dancing to "I'm a Rooster." From that moment forward, I was passionate about the arts. Blessed to have a family that valued an arts education, I took dance, piano, and vocal lessons. My teachers encouraged and supported my love of the arts. Grade school teachers taught us how to recite and memorize poems, and the music teachers gave us songs that have stayed with us for a lifetime. Oh, Shenandoah (you're humming it right now, aren't you?) In high school, we honed our talents, giving us more opportunities to learn and grow our passion for the arts. College comes next, and we stay the course, still determining where it will lead but knowing the arts must be a part of a life well lived.

After college, I found Robidoux Resident Theatre. I was in the audience for the first performance of *Our Town*, and I was hooked. My high school French teacher, Mary Brock, was an extraordinary

teacher although I was not an outstanding student, French is hard! But what I remember most about Mary is how she not only strived to teach the language but also showed us the culture

of the French, inviting some of her students to a Christmas celebration in her home. The dedication she showed to her students still makes me smile today. Mary took that same dedication a few years later to become the first full-time Allied Arts Council Executive Director in 1982. She laid the groundwork for the future of the Allied Arts Council. Under her leadership, Artscape, Artists in the Schools, Arts Fund, and Trails West!® were developed. During this time, I first became involved with the Allied Arts Council by serving on the Arts Fund Cabinet subcommittee. Mary was a taskmaster, training us well and keeping in contact (pre-emails) with phone calls, cajoling, and prodding us to make those calls! I admired Mary and her work to lift the arts in St. Joseph.

I've had many roles with the Allied Arts Council over the years; I volunteered, served on the board as president of RRT, chaired the Chautauqua and Hillside Reenactment Stages, and taught at Artscape and Art for Life. In 2004, Executive Director Wally Bloss resigned to take a new position in Utah, allowing me to apply for the position in 2005. I remember the process clearly; I was excited, scared, and a bit overwhelmed, but I knew I wanted to serve the larger arts community.

It is hard to believe it has been almost 19 years and an incredible ride. I count my board presidents as mentors and friends, and the Council board is an incredible group of people. The board sets policy, and the board members are also volunteers who work with staff to run the programs of the Allied Arts Council. Through their dedication, the Council staff can fulfill the Council's mission. Cathy and I have been reminiscing about all the people we've worked with over the years and their impact on us and the arts community. From teaching artists to Trails West!® steering committee, all have been dedicated volunteers who make the Council hum.

One of my biggest joys has been the people who worked in the office. The staff size has fluctuated over the years depending on programming and budget constraints, but the overall dedication to the job has been constant. We work collaboratively, lifting each other and stepping in to help ease someone's load. We've celebrated birthdays, weddings, and the birth of children and grandchildren. We are a team, a family. We've had some great people working for the Council. Cathy Ketter has been the one constant. She has served with three Executive Directors. She knows the history, what works and what doesn't. My success is thanks to Cathy's mentorship. One cannot know all that one needs to know to do the job you're hired to do. Cathy was the gentle reminder of what was next. We make a good team because we play to each

other's strengths and challenge each other to do better and be better. From Cathy, I learned to slow down and take more time, and Cathy learned from me it was ok to make changes, try something new, and take risks. We've had to face some tough challenges over the years. Making painful decisions to shutter programs that were no longer sustainable, but knowing for the health and longevity of the organization it was the right call.

For sixty-one years, the Council has worked to secure a vibrant, creative community, and I'm honored to have been a part of the journey. As I step back, I'm filled with a sense of excitement and anticipation for

the future of our arts community. I'm confident that the Allied Arts Council, with its rich history and dedicated members, will continue to positively impact our community, and I'm thrilled to see what the future brings with new leadership.

Nineteen years is a significant period, but it feels like it was just yesterday that I walked through the door to start my dream job. To all the people who've been a part of this journey, I want to express my heartfelt gratitude. Each one of you has played a crucial role in shaping my career and the success of the Allied Arts Council.

In February of 1993 there was an ad in the paper for a part-time position with the Allied Arts Council. Our daughters were then 4 and 8, and I was looking for part-time employment. I interviewed with Executive Director Mary Brock, and learned the newly created position was due to the increased staff workload with the upcoming initial Trails West! ® festival. The position was 6-9 hours per week and guaranteed through September 1993. I accepted the position, began March 2, and thirty-one years later, I am retiring as the full-time Operations Director.

What a different world it was thirty-one years ago. I shared a computer with program coordinator Heidi Downer, who would see me coming through the door and say “oh no” as she had to find something else to do. We all made things work, and luckily the Trails West! ® festival was successful and my employment continued.

The arts have always been a part of my life. In 1959, my father Gene Drimmel was a founding member and assistant concertmaster of the St. Joseph Symphony. As a little girl, I sat in the audience at the Missouri Theater and waved to him onstage. He felt every home should have a piano, and at age eight I began lessons with Virginia Gench, and my classical training continued through college at Mizzou. In high school I was an accompanist for the school musicals under the direction of Colleen Thom, and choir accompanist under the direction of Byron Myers, Tom Schneider and Marvin Gench, all wonderful and accomplished musicians. I still play, taught both our daughters,

and they are now teaching their children.

This career has been a good fit and has certainly grown through the years. I’ve had the privilege to work with wonderful people, including three executive directors, Mary Brock, Wally Bloss and Teresa Fankhauser; twenty-seven co-workers; board members; and committee volunteers, all with the mission to bring arts and people together. I worked with the arts education programs, including Artists in the Schools and Artscape. Artscape, the summer arts camp for children and my pride and joy, ran from 1988 to 2019, and I was here for 27 of the 32 years, during which the camp reached over 7,000 children.

Artscape was one of the reasons I’m still here, and it wouldn’t have succeeded without the Arts Education committee, class instructors, and on site coordinator, who for the last seven years was Darren Verbick. Thank you to all who had a part in making it happen.

I would like to thank the executive directors I’ve worked with: to Mary Brock for hiring me as I learned much from her and her devotion to the arts; to Wally Bloss for his leadership and continued advocacy; and to Teresa Fankhauser for her forward vision. Teresa and I have been a team for nineteen years, and we work well together as she’s broad picture and I’m detail-oriented and behind the scenes. Through the years we’ve had multiple work teams and have accomplished wonderful things. The arts are strong in St. Joseph, and the Allied Arts Council plays a vital role. I’m proud of all we have accomplished and look

forward to seeing what the future brings for the Council.

Thanks also to my husband Rick and our daughters Carrie & Jackie for being supportive of my career. The girls were Artscape kids, and some of their projects are still displayed in our home. It was fun sharing Trails West! ® with our older grandkids (we now have six, ages 2-12). The love of the arts continues from generation to generation, and I know my father would be proud.

Working for a non-profit brings satisfaction and fulfillment, and I’ve been so fortunate to have had such a long, enjoyable career. Retirement is bittersweet, as the Allied Arts Council and the people I’ve met and worked with through the years have been a big part of my life. We’ve all shared life experiences, happy and sad, and have been there for each other, not just as co-workers but as supportive friends. I’m going to miss the day to day contact and camaraderie, but am looking forward to more time with my husband, daughters and grandchildren, long walks with our English Lab, and time to play the piano.

Life is full of twists and turns and roads taken or not, and I’m thankful the road opened to the Allied Arts Council those many years ago.

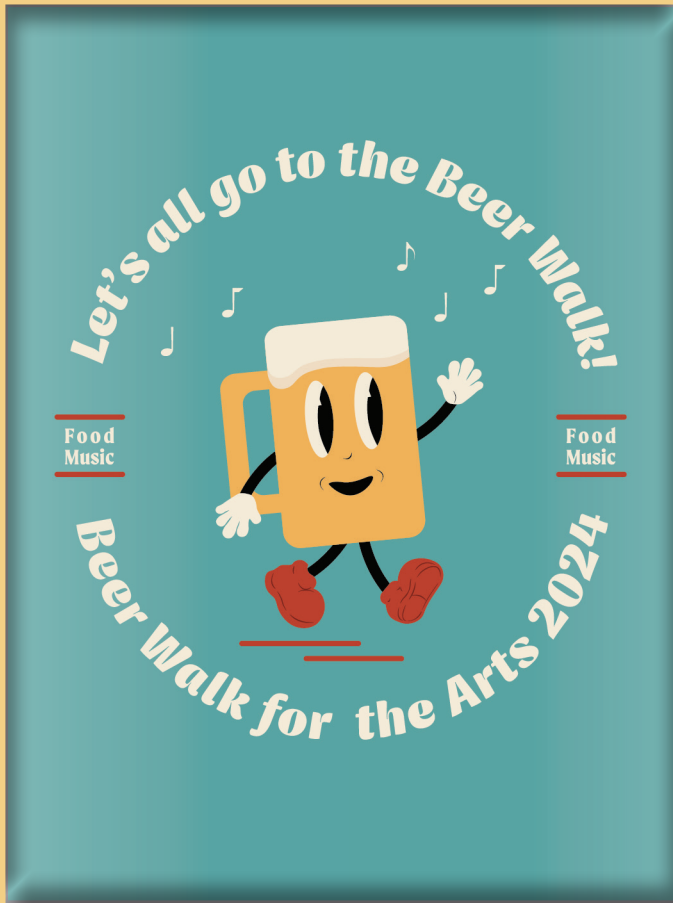

### the Sculpture Walk People's Choice Award Goes to....

The votes are in and the Allied Arts Council is proud to announce the winner of the 2023-2024 St. Joseph Sculpture Walk People's Choice Award. Located on the corner of North 7th and Edmond Street, "Motherly Love" caught the eye of local walkers as well as out-of-town guests.

The artist, Gedion Nyanhongo, of Fostoria, Ohio, was born in Zimbabwe, Africa. His father was a sculptor and he grew up loving the process of sculpting. His medium is spring stone and all of his sculptures, whether human, wildlife or abstract/symbolic are meant to spark emotion.

"Many artists create by building – I create by subtracting. The shape of the stone inspires me and I remove what doesn't belong. For this piece, I wanted to depict the intensity of the love between a mother and a young child," said

Nyanhongo. That bond seems to exist in every culture," he added.

"Motherly Love" is also staying here! Each year, the Allied Arts Council purchases a piece from the Sculpture Walk to donate to the City of St. Joseph and this year, "Motherly Love" is that donation.

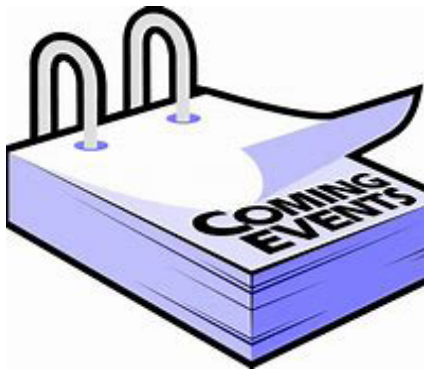
